## Curriculum Highlights

Language Arts: Second grade is a pivotal year for phonetic awareness and spelling. The Wonders series integrates a weekly concept, which emphasizes close reading text connections, and writing to accommodate different learning modalities.

*Math:* Our math curriculum is designed to engage students in hands-on learning and mathematical discovery; which assists students with computational fluency, geometry, measurement, and data analysis.

*Science:* Discovery Science introduces topics such as interactions within habitats, living and non-living things, weather changes, and the relationships between force and motion.

*Social Studies:* Citizenship, timelines, map skills, and economics are taught through real-life lessons and connections.

*Religion:* The students prepare for the sacraments of Reconciliation and Holy Eucharist in a comfortable, faith-filled environment.


## Mrs. Johnson

Mrs. Johnson has a psychology degree from The University of Michigan. She has taught elementary students at Rosary Cathedral and also served as a teacher's aid Saint Rose School. Mrs. Johnson is in her second year of teaching second grade at Saint Rose.

Saint Rose students take the "Measurement of Academic Performance" (MAP) each semester. Second graders take the Math and Reading test. The second grade students scored higher than the national and diocesan averages in both categories:





Each Friday, the second grade hosts a mystery reader. The students are given a clue each day, slowly revealing who the mystery reader will be. The students have an opportunity to use their math and logical reasoning skills to guess whom the reader will be. Past mystery readers include parents, faculty, students and community members.
